Pastor's Letter

With God

In the book

<u>With</u> — reimagining the way you relate to God author Skye Jethani observes that we all search for a way to relate to God that brings life and freedom.



In our relationship with God, we want to be delivered from fear to love and to restore meaning, beauty, and abundance to our lives and our world. In relating to God, we are also learning our own identity for how we understand God ultimately informs how we understand ourselves.

He outlines 5 possible paths for relating to God.

- "I am a sinner" living constantly under the threat of God's punishment. He calls this path "life under God."
- "I am a manager" a free person who is responsible for following principles and instructions in the Bible and whose fate is determined by how well this task is accomplished. He calls this path "life over God."
- "I am a consumer" who has many desires, longings, and demands, and expects them to be met even by God. He calls this path "life from God."
- "I am a servant" a worker whose sense of value is linked to the magnitude of my impact on the world. He calls this path "life for God."
- Only the fifth path, "I am beloved" opens us to our true selves and is revealed when we are "with God." Only life "with God" sees God as our true desire rather than a device. Only God sees who we are and, when we are in communion with God, God reveals our true nature to us over time.

Our Pentecost Prayer experience, when our congregation prayed every day for 15 days culminating on the day of Pentecost, was an opportunity to be "with God" together. In so doing, we were able to hear something of who we are as a church and where we might be led next.

We are still in the process of gathering and interpreting the information you wrote and spoke on May 15. Soon we will share what you communicated as part of our ongoing communal discernment of our way forward. And so, I invite your ongoing prayers for yourself and for our church. I believe your prayers and mine will open us to what is next for us together — with God.

We (the Mission Work Area) recently received an urgent request from the UMCOR hub at Bentley Springs UMC in Parkton, MD. They had been contacted by Mission Central in Pennsylvania to



spread the word that their supply of flood buckets was depleted and they were receiving calls from flooded areas desperate for these disaster kits.

Severe storms have affected many states such as Louisiana, Oklahoma, Texas, Missouri, Illinois, Tennessee, Mississippi, and others. The average cost of a five gallon bucket is about \$50, which contains 17 different items to assist people in cleaning up their homes after floods or hurricanes.




Good morning!



TOWN HALL MEETING

was held Sunday, May 22, 2016 at 11:15 AM in the sanctuary of Towson United Methodist Church immediately following the Alleluia Singers CANTATA

The following are the reports given by committees and work areas of the church:

HAMPTON LANE CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER COMMITTEE

The Hampton Lane Child Development Center (HLCDC) was established in 1977 and is a non-profit outreach ministry program to the community sponsored by Towson United Methodist Church. The HLCDC provides a warm, loving, and safe educational environment for children ages 2 through Pre-K and is licensed and has a Certificate of Approval by the Maryland State Department of Education. HLCDC does not discriminate against race, color, national origin, or religion when accepting children into its educational program. Forty four children are presently enrolled.

The Child Development Committee which oversees the operation of the Center is charged with addressing the various concerns of the Center's staff and teachers, the parents, the children, the Church and its staff, and the Maryland State Department of Education. All of these groups play an important role in the operation of the Center.

During the past year, some of the major accomplishments achieved included moving past a period of low enrollment that many centers as well as ours have experienced, providing tuition aid to several needy families, making a contribution to the Growing Forward campaign, improving the appearance of the classrooms and playground, and achieving a #1 rating from the EXCELS program of the Maryland State Department of Education. In addition, the Center Director, Erin Rigley, has added a number of new programs to farther enrich the excellence of the Center's educational curriculum.

During the coming year, I would like to see the CDC Committee continue to take an active role in the operation of the Center so as to take full advantage of the expertise of its members. I would like to see an expansion of the tuition aid program to benefit families in need in the community. I would like the Center to be fully enrolled, a challenge in the highly competitive world of pre-school centers, so that the community and TUMC may both benefit from the contributions that the Center can give. Finally, I would like to be able to continue to improve the working environment of the staff and teachers so that the education of our children will continue to be a happy and rewarding experience for all.

We had 17 tutors who generously gave their time for 23 weeks, some coming for both hours to work with the students.

A series of career speakers motivated and inspired our children with their messages this spring, and the end of year dinner was most exciting with award medals, delicious food prepared by Sally Savidge, and Tavon Mason's challenge encouraging the children to "Dare to be great!"

For the 2016-17 school year we are looking for a weekly snack helper and a special events coordinator to help with our Christmas Party and End of Year dinner. If you are interested in joining us in any capacity, please contact Susan Killian.

MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Men's Fellowship is a new men's ministry here at TUMC. This past winter, Rod assembled a few men to lead the formation of the group: Steve Schnur, Dave Turlington, Earl Smith and Joe Corson. The leadership team is currently reading a book called "Sleeping Giant" and taking some ques from that book to begin forming the Men's Fellowship. Over the last few months, we've invited the men of the church to three different meetings. The first two were in a discussion format and last week we just enjoyed some fellowship with a little church lot barbeque. Attendance has been between 15 and 30 men. The mission and format are still under development but the interest has been great.

WOMEN'S MINISTRIES

What is Women's Ministries?

As each of the present groups shared their goals, a common thread ran through each group. A journey of faith by women seeking to support, comfort, and sustain each other as they grow in their Christian faith and walk with Jesus.

What are the various opportunities available now to women at TUMC?

Women's Sunday School Class

Trish Turlington shared a history of how the women's class evolved:

In 1997, a group of women began meeting on Thursday evenings for Christian education. Over the next 16 or 17 years,

they studied a variety of books on Christian living, parenting, prayer, women and men of the Bible as well as in depth studies of particular books of the Bible. They developed strong relationships and supported each other in times of need. The members spanned the generations, and changed over the years, coming and going as schedules allowed, depending on the time of year, children's sports or other obligations. In September 2014, the class moved to Sunday mornings during Christian Connections time. We continue to explore ways to deepen our relationship with Christ. The class is currently team taught by Alicia Corson, Robin Smith and Trish Turlington. We welcome any women of the church to come join us.

Sojourner Sisters

Sojourner Sister's began on April 13, 2005 following our first Women's Retreat.

Under the leadership of Sue LaHatte, this group is open to all women who are seeking a personal relationship with God and growth in their Christian faith. They meet twice each month (during the school year) with an optional time for lunch and fellowship (bring a bag lunch and drink.) There is then an hour for discussion and reflection. Dates, time and book study material will be available toward the end of the summer. Why do we meet? As women of faith, seeking growth in our faith, we need each other - as mentors, as friends, as sisters.

Women's Retreat

Why have a Women's Retreat? A time set aside for women to gather in fellowship, learning and to be on a journey of Christian faith together. One of the women on our Design Team made a comment this year. It did not matter where we went on the retreat, we just need to be together. We have held our retreats at West River, Greenwood Hills, and Pearlstone. On April 21 - 23, 2017, we will travel to a new location - the Bishop Claggett Center in Adamstown, MD. As the Design Team begins planning. They will have a discussion of what the retreat will look like next year: a new location, new theme, and new ideas.

HOSPITALITY

The Hospitality Ministries Committee currently has 17 members who are committed to providing a welcoming and friendly atmosphere for visitors and members by extending themselves in a gracious way.

Our group hosts the coffee hour, new member receptions, the Confirmation reception, and the Easter Sunday brunch.

Members of the Hospitality Ministries Committee at the Welcome Station are likely among the first to greet parishioners and guests as they enter our foyer. We are also responsible for recruiting greeters who welcome you as you enter the narthex.

A fairly new mission started a few years ago to help keep in touch with our congregation is our birthday post card mailing. A photo of the church and its surrounds changes each year.

An ongoing effort of our committee involves the green attendance cards found in the pew racks. When visitors leave their contact information, we reach out to them to engage in conversation and request information regarding their worship experience as well as answer any questions they may have regarding the various ministries and classes we offer. For members, these green cards serve to register weekly and

seasonal attendance patterns so we can call anyone who attends regularly but is absent for a few weeks in a row. The purpose of our doing this is to make sure our members know they are missed when they can't attend and to determine whether there is a problem with which the church can offer assistance. People who receive a call appreciate that we care about them and made the call. We encourage you to sign the green cards every week. We also ask if you could please refrain from using the green cards as doodle cards. Thank you.

Lastly, twice during the year we organize drives to collect items for the women and children at the House of Ruth. We have been supporting this mission of House of Ruth for 5 years.

We are committed to serving our church, our community, and our Lord to provide a welcoming, friendly atmosphere for visitors and members.

SERVANTS-IN-SERVICE

Who are **Servants-in-Service**?

As we go forward SIS is now encouraging all to be in dialogue to get to know each other better, to realize our gifts and unleash the potential in each other to the service each one is called to do.

PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

This month marks the 9th year anniversary of the Prayer Shawl Ministry at TUMC. Over those years, we have made many hundreds of shawls which are donated to GBMC and St. Joseph's as well as being available to anyone in our church who wishes to pick one up for a loved one or anyone in need. This is a remarkable accomplishment and reflects the incredible commitment and dedication of our members to a ministry that touches countless lives. We continue to meet three times each month, year-round, although some of our most prolific shawl-makers do not usually attend the meetings. One person in particular, Eleanor Brown, drops off sometimes a dozen or more shawls each month so that they can be blessed along with the rest of the shawls.

In thinking about what I wanted to say about our Prayer Shawl Ministry—specifically what we've done over this past year, I was reminded of something that Alicia Corson said at the Pentecost service last week. She challenged us all to ask ourselves what does love look like and how do we demonstrate God's love within and outside the walls of our church. The Prayer Shawl Ministry is an answer to that question in a very tangible and profound way. For sure, our meetings are lively and fun. We've shared concerns and joys, and supported each other in our craft. We've taught others how to knit or crochet, shared patterns and ideas, and offered advice on projects and assistance with problems we may be encountering. In addition, over the years, we've supported each other through the death of loved ones, grief and loss; births, graduations, weddings, and countless other celebrations. That is what happens within the walls of this church. But the best way to describe how we impact those beyond these walls is through the stories of people whose lives have been dramatically impacted by our shawls in the past year.

One story is a personal one for me. Earlier this year as we were both arriving for church one Sunday morning, I was talking with Eleanor Brown about a baby whose mother works as a nurse at Hopkins and whom I have come to know over the past few years. She had delivered her second baby, a beautiful little girl, just days before, but the baby suffered serious problems shortly after birth and was very quickly transferred to the Neonatal ICU and then within a day was moved to the Pediatric ICU for a type of treatment only offered in that unit. As I shared with Eleanor how sick this baby was, she immediately offered to bring in a pink baby blanket that she had at home. She brought the blanket in that week and at one of our monthly meetings, we blessed it along with all of the shawls that had been donated. I was able to take the blanket to the hospital and gave it to Amanda, the mother, who immediately put it on her baby's bed in the midst of all of the tubes, catheters, and machinery. Unfortunately, in spite of all of the best interventions available, little Allyssa did not survive. But I truly believe that that beautiful pink blanket wrapped her in God's love as she took her last breath. And it was at the front of the room in the funeral home during her memorial service, as a reminder of God's presence and love. Her parents and extended family were so moved by that gift and so thankful to our church and our ministry for making it possible. I also gave the mother one of our shawls and she told me recently how much that has meant to her these past months and that it is something she will always cherish.

Another story was shared by Phyllis Napfel who is a nurse at Shock Trauma at University of Maryland Hospital and who gave one of our shawls to a coworker. Here is what Phyllis wrote:

"Last December one of my co-workers experienced a traumatic event. I was not particularly close to her, but felt I needed to do something after I heard what had happened. I learned that her boyfriend had tried to commit suicide and she called the police, but he grabbed a knife and ended up being shot and killed by the police in her house and in her presence. I did not know what to do or say. That is where God and the Holy Spirit came into the story, giving me a nudge. God gave me the

idea to send her a prayer shawl. Her friends said that she believed in God, so I thought, why not? I was trying to figure out when I could get it from church and went into the church parlor on Christmas Eve to look at the prayer shawls in the basket. She is a huge Ravens fan, so I thought, maybe there will be a purple one. Sure enough, there was a beautiful purple prayer shawl right on top! I took it and then I had to actually go to the Post Office and mail it, you know, a little extra effort, but I still felt it was important to follow the nudge. I sent a card along with it and included some scripture readings, thoughts and prayers. I got a card from her some time later. Here is what she wrote:

"That was probably the most thoughtful and special gift I ever received. The card alone brought me to tears. The blanket is gorgeous and I absolutely love the purple. I slept with it every night especially on the trip to the funeral. This has been the most traumatic and saddening event of my life. God, my family, and friends have been my saving grace. Thank you so much for thinking so thoughtfully of me. God is great. I will cherish this gift forever."

And once she came back to work, we started talking and she shared some of her struggles with me, and then promptly said, "I am not sure why I just told you all that." I told her it was because God was working through both of us and His handprint was on everything from the nudge to give the shawl, to the purple one being on top, to her receiving it right before the funeral, and now her sharing with me some of her innermost thoughts."

These are two powerful and very personal stories, but each one of our shawls could probably tell a story like these, of grace and healing, promise and hope. The Prayer Shawl Ministry at this church began as a result of one of God's "nudges" and those of us involved in this ministry continue to seek to respond to God's direction. When I asked the group what they thought I should tell you all today about our vision for the future, they simply said that they want to continue to do what we've been doing all along. We all believe in the amazing power of the prayers and love that are stitched into each and every one of our shawls. That is our mission and our ministry and that is how we are demonstrating God's love in this world.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

Theme-based worship series have been well received. These have included "Servants in Service," "When Life Doesn't Make Sense," "The Yeses of Advent," "Learning How to Dance with God," "Cleaning House" (spiritual practices), and "Opening the Door." This summer our series will focus on the "Parables of Jesus."

The 8:15 chapel service is supported musically by Joyce Keedy and Dee Solomon, and have a strong weekly attendance. The 10:15 worship service features a variety of music styles to meet the varied preferences of our congregation.

Music is an important part of our worship experience. Examples include

- Combined choir Advent/Christmas music service 3rd
 Week of Advent.
- Carol Choir worship musicals on Christmas Eve at 5 and Palm Sunday at 10:15.

- Alleluia Singers will sing and lead the 10:15 service on May 22.
- Our youth and adults serving as instrumentalists and in bell choirs.

We offer a variety of worship experiences throughout the church year, including:

- Attentional prayer offered every Tuesday evening.
- ◆ Special experiential worship during Lent 2 on Holy Thursday and 2 on Good Friday.
 - 15-Day Prayer for the Church held May 1 May 15.
- A confirmation service where we confirmed 3 young men on Pentecost this year.

We have a new projector and screen and speakers to support weekly worship services, and new microphones for better recordings of church services.

A large number of members participate in the services by offering community prayers, reading scripture, helping to prepare and serve communion, ushering, sharing personal testimonies (e.g., Allie Corson on June 12th) and assisting in other ways. In addition, Fred Crider, Joyce Keedy, and Doug Hollida offer original texts and music to support our worship experiences.

Fresh flowers are on the altar every week. Be sure to check the bulletin board to the left of the main office door for available dates and donation envelopes.

CARING MINISTRY – (reaching our shut-ins)

We have many members who have been quietly involved in this type of service ministry for many years; they have taken notice of who isn't present and have reached out to them. Over the past year we asked the congregation if they might have a desire to serve the church in this ministry too. Several people responded and have become involved by sending cards, making phone calls and visiting our shut-ins if possible.

We also have a few folks who visit people during their hospital stays and in the rehab centers. As with any caring ministry, more volunteers willing to make personal contact with home-bound parishioners are always welcome.

It is a wonderful practice for all of us to be aware of folks whom we may not have seen at church in a while and to reach out to them. It is so important for the continued growth of the church that we take notice of those who are no longer "in their seats," so to speak. In fact this is the first step in knowing who might have needs that we as a church may fulfill. Making the church aware is an important step in this process.

Continuing relationships with our church family is the objective of this caring ministry. If this appeals to you please let Robin Smith, Margery and/or Rod know.

RECONCILING AND ACCEPTING METHODISTS ("RAMs")

As stated in the Welcoming Statement published each week in our bulletin (and each month in our High Spire), our congregation celebrates diversity, committing ourselves to Jesus' example of inclusive love for all persons, regardless of (among other things) sexual orientation and gender identity. However, we are not a "fully" inclusive church in the sense that

we have not publicly called for the repeal of those provisions of church law which discriminate against lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) persons. A congregation that has taken this next step is a "reconciling" church.

The mission of the TUMC RAMs is to advocate for the full inclusion of LGBT persons in the life and ministry of the United Methodist Church. To that end, we have sponsored educational programs exploring the scriptural and ethical dimensions of these issues as well as inclusion-themed social events (including a summer series of movie nights).

Most recently, we have conducted a registration drive in support of the Reconciling Ministries Network (the RMN), a nationwide organization which also seeks to make the church more accepting and inclusive by repealing discriminatory church laws.

Church law can only be changed by the General Conference, which is an assembly of Methodist representatives from all over the world that meets every four years. The General Conference met May 10 - 20 in Portland, Oregon, and the RMN actively supported the efforts made to change church law. (More about this at our Town Hall meeting.)

In advance of the General Conference, the RAMs encouraged members of our congregation to join the RMN, primarily by maintaining a registration table in the foyer before and after the 10:15 worship service. (Our "Choose Love" campaign. You may have seen some of those who have joined the RMN wearing "Choose Love" buttons.)

We recognized the difficulties this effort faced. Many in our congregation are unaware of the church's discriminatory laws, and so there was an educational challenge. There is also a reluctance to "join" any unfamiliar organization, especially when a good deal of personal information (address, e-mail address, phone number) is being requested. The natural inclination of many would be to avoid engagement and pass us by.

In light of these challenges, we thought 50 TUMC RMN members would be a good indication of congregational support for full inclusion. The response of the congregation has been overwhelmingly positive, and we are very pleased to report that (so far) 96 have joined the RMN.

Disregard of church law as it affects LGBT persons is widespread in the United States, and as of this writing it is unclear how the General Conference will act regarding the more than 100 petitions that have been filed which relate to issues of human sexuality.

A few members of the Education Work Area have been working on an Emergency Plan for TUMC. Our main focus has been to develop a plan in case of a fire. Once we have that in place, we may look into other areas such as sheltering in place, etc. We have met with a Baltimore County Fire Marshal and received recommendations from him. In the coming months, please look for maps with evacuation routes posted in each room much like you would see in a hotel. We will also be placing cards in the pews with evacuation routes from the sanctuary.

FINANCE

We began 2015 with a sizeable negative number and ended the year with a substantial positive number – all thanks to your faithful giving and to the staff who carefully managed expenses.

The budget for 2016 is balanced and is shown below. January and February receipts were very strong; however, March and April giving was weak, and even Easter income was less than expected. We hope our usual "summer slump" has moved to spring and our summer income will rebound.

A very comprehensive and thorough audit of CDC revealed no discrepancies or deficiencies. Ken Klueh donated his time and financial expertise for this audit.

STEWARDSHIP

Pledges for the fall 2015 stewardship campaign slightly exceed the budgeted pledge income for 2016. As of now actual receipts are lower than pledged amounts. We encourage all of you to keep up with your commitments.

New speakers in the sanctuary will enhance the worship experience for everyone — they will be installed by May 29.

The next project to be undertaken will be the windows once sufficient Growing Forward funds have been received. We hope that the project will be completed by early spring 2017.

PROPERTY & MAINTENANCE

P&M handles major projects funded by the trustees as well as routine building issues supported by the operating budget.

A new gas range, warming oven and refrigerator have been installed in the fellowship hall kitchen.

A new overhead door was installed in the garage.

Crepe myrtle trees were planted in the parking lot to replace the dead oaks which were planted by Don McWilliams over 50 years ago.

And, about twice a month we are more traditional, with one of these Sundays including an old-fashioned-hymn-sing. Every Sunday, we hear from the 3,000 pipes of our glorious organ. And, every Sunday we are blessed by one or more of our five vocal choirs or three handbell choirs. You may hear anything from an a cappella anthem in Latin from the 1500s, to a classic with the organ, to a recent song accompanied by our praise band. Communion is offered on the first Sunday of the month, and is open to all.

We have gluten-free bread, too, just ask the server.

Orders need to be placed by Noon Tuesday BEFORE the Sunday.


