A Reipe for Church

An amateur saxophonist, I have long wanted to go to New Orleans for the music and the experience. As of now, a trip to New Orleans will remain on my bucket list. In the mean time, our son Andrew was in New Orleans just before Mardi Gras. He is a film guy and was filming a chef by the name of John Besh, who owns ten restaurants and has been seen on many cooking shows, though I have to admit that I hadn't heard of him.



Andrew was directing a cooking show pilot for a tiny start-up company which creates



interactive video systems where they film events from up to 16 different angles, and then the viewer can decide which angle to watch. Andrew filmed John Besh cooking with 13 separate cameras. His job involved deciding where the cameras would be placed, lighting and sound, and coaching the chef so he looked and sounded good.


I could hear satisfaction and joy in Andrew as he talked about the artful creativity involved in his work. Those are the emotions that every parent wants to hear from their children when they

talk about their vocation. We like to know that their work means more than a paycheck (though those are needed!).

My hope is that going to church on Sunday mornings can be a time to enjoy participating in something that is larger than we are. The sweep of God's presence and action comes to us unformed and awaiting the contribution of our perspectives and involvement in the present moment. In the weekly enacting of life-with-Christ, we are all like co-directors and audience at the same time. Even though we may think we are in the background, the focus, attention and energy we give help make church more than a weekly ritual. Each of us adds our own perspectives and the total experience becomes more than a sum of the parts.

After the television shoot, Andrew and the rest of the crew got to eat what the chef created — seafood gumbo, fried quail, and strawberry pudding. Yet the experience was co-created by everyone — just as I imagine church to be each Sunday. And it is for all of us to enjoy the fruits of our joyful labor. After all, the word liturgy actually means "the work of the people." Let us enjoy it together.

the PATHWAYS board will be working on a new challenge. I will be stepping down as Director and Board

Chair as of June 1. As a result, we will be searching for new leaders for this very worthwhile program. I have been privileged to help the program grow over the last 7 years into what it is today. I say that with pride and a great deal of gratitude to all those who have been an integral part of that growth.

Partnerships with the schools, TUMC, and Lovely Lane UMC, parents, tutors, and students are what have made this program successful. We also work with RSVP (Retired Senior Volunteer Program) through Baltimore County, who not only have supplied many tutors, but have directed us toward other resources that benefit our students.

When I was asked to take on this project 7 years ago, I did so because I felt a calling to continue to use the open space at TUMC to benefit students in need. Justin Jones and LuAnn Blackman were the people who made sure that this program had a beginning and a focus. When Justin asked if I would be willing to take the program to the next level, I drew on my understanding of what God's plans were and said "yes."

Through working with PATHWAYS I have learned many things. There are many good people who care about the plight of at-risk, low income students. Year

after year, the students and their families are grateful and aware of our mission, and that it is tied directly to the love and generosity of our church and its commitment to the community. I have learned that it is vital to interact and love others in a very concrete way, including loving them through frustrations, family crisis, school problems, and peer challenges. Our 1-on-1 tutoring/mentoring has been a gift to students who are surrounded by the noise and distractions of life. And finally, it is possible to help each student become more confident in his/her ability to successfully meet academic challenges.

The sub-committee heading up the search for new leadership will be Liz Neal, Annie Biser, Susan Killian, Justin Jones, and myself. We will be looking both within and outside our own congregation for people to fill the various roles. In the near future, this committee will be providing more details concerning the characteristics and skills needed for the new leadership positions. Sharing the leadership will not only make it more manageable for those who lead, but it will infuse the program with new ideas.

I ask that you pray that we will be able to identify a team of leaders in the next few months. I have no doubt that, with God's guidance, this will happen. With the help of the congregation, and possibly you reading this right now, we will welcome new leadership for the 10th year and beyond!

TUMC Supported Missionary Victor Doolakeh Taryor departs UMC Liberia Ganta Hospital Posted by <u>Julu Swen</u>, *West African Writers*, February 3, 2015

Taryor, who was commissioned Missionary by the UMC General Board of Global Ministries in 2008, started as student and transitioned through several positions including shift supervisor and director of nursing services. According to Taryor, his eight years were spent building the capacity of the people who work with the UMC Ganta hospital. "You can have all the infrastructures and technologies, if you don't have the people to work with them, you have nothing," he added. On the question of where he was heading, Taryor said, "I am a staunch United Methodist and will provide consultant service to the church once my service is needed." Taryor presided over several health intervention projects at the hospital including the fistula and Ebola outbreaks which is now ebbing in Liberia.



Gratitude from the Bishop

Bishop Marcus Matthews, epsicopal leader of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, expresses his appreciation to the churches of the Baltimore-Washington Conference for their commitment to connectional giving and supporting mission and ministry beyond the local church.

Dear Friends:

When I look at the apportionment payments made by the churches of the Baltimore-Washington Conference in 2014, I'm reminded of the saying, "We can give without loving, but we cannot love without giving." Each of the 520 churches that paid 100 percent of their apportionments has my thanks and praise. For many of them, this act of love required hard choices and some sacrifice. Be assured that your contribution will accomplish significant and transformative mission and ministry. I know that stewardship is a journey; sometimes a difficult one. If there is ever any assistance I, the district superintendents or the conference staff can provide to help you and your church along this journey, please do not hesitate to ask.

About \$11 of every \$100 you put in the collection plate goes beyond your local church to provide mission and ministry in a connectional way, providing opportunities that no one church could accomplish alone. Of that \$11, about \$2.50 goes to the worldwide church to expand our impact and outreach on a global scale. There is strength and potential in our connection and our apportionments demonstrate that in remarkable ways.

As the Lenten season approaches, I want to invite you and your congregation to contribute in a way that enriches

ministries right outside your door. I'm asking each United Methodist in the Baltimore-Washington Conference to give one dollar a day during Lent, from Feb. 18 through April 4. That \$40 per person (Sundays don't count in Lent), given in the spirit of self-sacrifice and new life, should be given to each local church. It is my hope that these Lenten gifts will translate into a love offering that changes the lives of those who live around our churches. As connectional people, we live in an exciting place — serving locally and beyond our communities. How we give reflects that. I thank each of you for your apportionment giving. It matters. I thank you, too, for all you're doing to serve God exactly where you are. I pray for you and your church each day and in that simple, daily prayer, ask God to make you rich in spirit and blessed beyond measure.
