

Some Thoughts on Revitalization

Last month, Pastor Rod shared an article with me that really got me thinking. The article was titled “What It Takes to Revitalize the Mainline” and it was written by Bishop Bruce Ough and Rev. Susan Nienaber, both United Methodist clergy.

Ough and Nienaber begin their article with the assertion that “it is possible to revitalize our mainline congregations and denominational structures.” They then go on to say that much work has been done on the “mechanics” of reversing the current downward trend of mainline denominational churches, but the mechanics are not enough. What is equally important (and I would say, perhaps more important) is “the attitude, mindset, stance, and practices of leaders leading this revitalization work.” As I read through the article, I thought, this is not for only clergy or lay leaders, this applies to every member of our congregation, every person who we worship with, learn with, and live our lives with.

The authors outline eight points in their article, but I felt the first three were of utmost importance to us at Towson UMC, I am going to paraphrase them here.

Prayer is Absolutely Essential!

Everyday it is essential to ground ourselves in prayer. We still operate in a culture where prayer is often about getting something rather than an act of letting go, but the kind of prayer that is necessary for us as church members is about opening ourselves up so that we can be available to God’s purposes - essentially getting out of God’s way.

Believe That God Is at Work and Will Continue To Work.

Closely related to prayer is the firm belief that God is already at work and will continue to work to guide and direct our transformation efforts. A key to success in this is the language that we all use. “What we speak becomes the house we live in” (Sufi poet Hafiz). The pall of despair and decline has become too pervasive. The lamenting must stop and we must focus our whole selves on God’s work – this means being very careful and intentional about the words we choose to use. How do we do that? See point number 3.

Look For the Miracles and Tell the Stories of Transformation.

We’re talking about the ordinary moments when God’s love and grace overwhelms our sensibilities, when we see our church become submerged in God’s goodness. Here are some quick examples I came up with:

- ☞ VBC, what a miracle to see so many children, youth, and adults learning and celebrating God’s love
- ☞ A moment of welcome for a family from another culture who were visiting our church to celebrate a baptism. They specifically commented on how

welcome they felt here.

- ☞ Our members helping our brothers and sisters at John Wesley UMC this spring and summer.
- ☞ A group of our youth went to an assisted living facility near Lovely Lane UMC and cleaned up their gardens for them.
- ☞ Sally Savidge’s willingness to share what the Holy Spirit was saying to her at our Town Hall Meeting.

These are just a few examples I came up with, I know there are many, many more. I encourage all of us to take some time and look for the miracles, they are happening here, we just may need to open our eyes to see them.

We are at a turning point here at TUMC, it is time for us to focus on the work God is doing within and through our congregation and to talk about all the ways we see and experience His presence in our lives. We have gone through some rough waters, and we’re probably not done, but God has been faithful throughout and we need to share these stories and encourage one another with the truth that He is at work within us and, through prayer and discernment, He will continue to guide and direct us.



**We are collecting Sunday, September 6
AND — throughout the month of September**

Thank you for being a vital part of the community and for being a part of our family! Earl's Place is a transitional housing program, technically a shelter, **but for the men who live here, it is home.**

We are excited to share some of the things that your donations help make possible. Since we last saw you, 14 of 19 men moved to permanent housing while 17 (our capacity) are still at Earl's Place. One of our most recent residents is deaf. Prior to coming to Earl's Place, he was living in the woods in Annapolis. He had been homeless for over a year, was estranged from his family with unmanaged mental health needs. Today he is a happy and motivated individual who has reconnected with friends on Facebook, made new friends and is looking forward to returning to Anne Arundel County in permanent housing. Several men continued their education; two of them, Robert and Victor, completed the culinary training course at Moveable Feast and, following their internships, were hired.

We are also pleased to announce that **Prospect Place**, our second project, will be opening in September. Located in Rosedale, Prospect Place is a permanent supportive housing project that will provide twelve men with an efficiency apartment that will be theirs for as long as they wish, provided they follow the standard tenant rules. **You can help to make these apartments homes;** a complete wish list of items is on our registry at target.com — first name: Prospect, last name: Place. Don't feel like shopping? Your communion/mission offering during September will be very helpful!

We could go on and on, **but here is the key.** Without you and others in the community, none of this would be possible. You are changing lives every day! Thank you! We look forward to seeing you on September 6.

Youth With A Mission

As my first year of college was coming to an end, it felt like my life wasn't going the way I wanted and that God was calling me to something different.

**Baltimore-Washington Annual
Conference Report
May 27-30, 2015**

Meeting less than a mile from where the Methodist Church began in 1784, and just a few miles from where riots broke out in late April 2015, United Methodists of the Baltimore-Washington Conference started and ended their Annual Conference Session with one thought: being Christ's presence in the City of Baltimore.

More than 1,200 clergy, laity, and guests gathered at the Marriott Waterfront. They heard and saw riveting reports of how they have responded following the riots that devastated the Sandtown-Winchester neighborhood of southwest Baltimore. Bishop Marcus Matthews presided over the event. Baltimore Mayor Stephanie Rawlings - Blake greeted the assembly, thanking United Methodists for opening their doors on the day after the unrest and for still being there in ministry and mission long after the TV cameras had left. The Conference members heard a report from the laity and clergy who serve the area. Rev. Michael Parker, who lives in the neighborhood but who pastors Ames UMC in Bel Air, was commissioned Probationary Elder by Matthews on May 30. He was joined by 12 other candidates in that category along with two who were commissioned as Deacon.

On Thursday evening, the Circle of Grace process occurred. Conference members gathered in small groups in the hotel ballroom,

sitting in circles of 10-12 people. There, guided by the Bishop, members listen to one another discuss four resolutions that had come to the conference seeking approval before being sent to the 2016 General Conference. The first petition sought to remove from the Book of Discipline the sentence, "The United Methodist Church does not condone the practice of homosexuality and considers this practice incompatible with Christian teaching." The other three resolutions concerned issues between science, theology, and the church. Members voted on each resolution. That petition will now go to the 2016 General Conference. Only General Conference has the authority to change the Book of Discipline. A resolution in the Book of Resolutions around "God's Creation and the Church" was approved by the members. Two other petitions – one opposing the teaching of creation in public schools, and one on climate change – were defeated.

Jen Ihlo, chair of the BWC's Rules Committee, brought a resolution that would incorporate the Circle of Grace process into the conference rules. Currently, conference rules must be suspended to use the Circle of Grace process. Matthew Sichel, a lay member from Wesley UMC in Hampstead, moved to amend the resolution. His amendment sought to bring a way into the Circle process whereby petitions and/or resolutions could be amended during the process. Currently, this is not possible. Bishop Matthews

halted the discussion for the Memorial Service, a so-called "order of the day."

During lunch the three had talked. Sichel and Ihlo came to the podium and announced that they were withdrawing the resolution and the amendment. They will work together on a new resolution by Fall.

At the Memorial Service, members celebrated the lives of bishops, clergy, clergy spouses, and laity who had died in the previous conference year.

The Conference members:

- ✦ celebrated the ministry of Sandy Ferguson, who is retiring from the Conference Staff as Director of Connectional Ministries after 29 years of service.
- ✦ Honored the retirement of 16 clergy representing more than 490 years of service.
- ✦ Elected clergy and laity delegates to the 2016 General and Jurisdictional Conferences.
- ✦ Overwhelmingly approved the \$17.2 million budget.
- ✦ Celebrated that 82% of the BWC congregations paid 100% of their apportionments in 2014.


ODE TO PLUTO


